



Expenses





- Title I Schools Served:


 Title 1 schools are provided additional support and funding to improve academic achievement for historically underserved students.

Student Participation By School District





atal math and literacy

Sacramento County students are struggling with fundamental math and literacy skills. Based on the 2018-19 school year results of the California assessment of student performance and progress, 51 percent of students in Sacramento County did not meet grade-level standards in English Language Arts and Literacy, and 62 percent did not meet the grade-level standards in mathematics. Recent studies from Policy Analysis for California Education show that due to the COVID-19 pandemic California students are experiencing, on average, a 2.6 month learning lag in English Language Arts and 2.5 months in math.

The 916 STEAM Academy provides standard-aligned workshops and tutoring for 1st through 12th grade students throughout Sacramento County.

Year-long paid fellowships for individuals interested in changing the literacy and STEAM (Science Technology Engineering Arts Math) outcomes for local youth are available.

Ma Vang was a part-time tutor with 916 Ink's Read On! Literacy Tutoring Program before continuing her journey as an AmeriCorps Page Turner for 2022-2023. She took another opportunity to extend her service with the 916 STEAM academy to a second term for the 2023-2024 school year. From being nervous with tutoring for the first time and now serving a second year with AmeriCorps, Vang became a successful representative at a school site to help administer tutoring sessions for 1st-5th graders requiring additional support with their reading skills. Her journey of re-learning to read and teach students has impacted her positively. Vang also participated in a literacy tutoring program in her elementary years, coming full circle to become a mentor to these striving readers. She could not have done it without the assistance and continuous support of the 916 Ink Staff Members and her AmeriCorps Manager.



Read On! delivers literacy tutoring for striving readers in grades 1-5 to help them reach grade-level reading goals. Students receive reading instruction, anchored in the Science of Reading, from volunteer tutors and staff. Lessons include instruction in phonological and phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, vocabulary, and comprehension.

90 students

2938 hours of tutoring

69% of students made significant growth towards grade-level reading goals.

74% of students report enjoying reading more since participating in Read On!

94% of students report they feel Confident or Very Confident in reading since participating in Read On!







J.J. was beginning his third-grade year when he was enrolled in the Read On! Literacy Tutoring program at Caroline Wenzel Elementary. J.J. was initially quiet and shy working with our tutors and staff. Even though the tutoring sessions were conducted virtually, our program coordinator, Zuzu, found a way to bond with J.J. over their mutual love of movies. J.J. and Zuzu would watch the same film each week so they could discuss it during his tutoring session. Zuzu was so excited to see J.J. jump from reading at a first-grade level to reading at a second-grade level by the end of the school year. J.J.'s second year of Read On! tutoring saw him achieve his grade-level reading goals and he is now able to read alongside his peers.

Find Your Voice

The Find Your Voice creative writing workshop series for grades 3-12, aims to empower young people to find their voice and become published authors. Youth leave our programs with increased self-confidence, improved academic ability, and are inspired to continue writing in their day-to-day lives. Students are exposed to diverse voices and engage with language and storytelling freely and playfully.

Emi was nervous when she began 916 Ink's Amplify Creative Writing Summer Camp. She hid behind her more outgoing older sister and was reluctant to share her work or participate in activities. That first day seemed to overwhelm her, but she pushed through her fear and dove into writing. Our staff soon learned that Emi loved to write about dragons and throughout the week she managed to make every writing prompt — no matter how unrelated — about the epic fire breathing beasts. She built independence from her sister and made friends. Emi's parents noticed the changes in her throughout the program, noting that Emi was displaying passion and bravery in telling and creating stories. After participating in Amplify, Emi published five original stories, including her almost 1000 word epic about her favorite topic: dragons.
